Founding member of the Jericho Stewardship Group, John Coope has worked hard for 20 years to remove invasive plant species from Vancouver's Jericho Beach Park. He has conducted weekly patrols, kept a detailed inventory of the park's 300 plant species, and reduced invasive wild chervil from 30,000 plants to almost none.

Dr. Laurence Packer singlehandedly created the largest bee collection in Canada. The Packer Lab at York University houses over 90% of the world's bee genera.
